Hamilton Pool Road Planning Group Initial Group Meeting, September 2, 2004 Draft Meeting Summary

Executive Summary

After a welcome by Robert Potts, the Executive Director of Westcave Preserve, the 13 members introduced themselves and stated a goal they had for this process and what unique talent or perspective they brought to the group. Juli Fellows reviewed the goals, process and parameters of the group using the handout from the July 27th public meeting. She told the group that Joe Lessard, the Director of the Southwest Travis County Advisory Group, had expressed a strong interest in collaborating with the HPR group but the specifics of how that collaboration might work are still being discussed. Mary Thompson reviewed the collaborative process and what consensus meant.

The rest of the meeting was spent deciding about adding members to the group. The group identified some gaps in representation among the initial group. They then identified candidates who could meet those gaps. They agreed to add the following people:

<u>Becky Combs</u>, representing interests of recreational users and environmental activists/experts (Travis County Audubon Society)

Tom Kemler, representing Saddletree Ranch residents' interests

Michael Murphy, with interests and expertise in photography and aesthetics

<u>Rick Schroeter</u>, representing interests of those who live beyond Westcave Preserve, and <u>Robert Potts</u>, representing preserves and parks in the area.

There was an interest in having someone in the group who could be a voice for the interests and perspectives of "higher density" developers. The group agreed that Bob Ayres and Linda Ellis would coordinate re-inviting Rebecca Hudson to join the group (she had declined previously because of commitments to the SwTravis County Advisory Group and the Regional Water Quality Group). If Rebecca does not join the group, they will ask her for ideas about who might represent those interests (not who might represent Rebecca personally.) The group will consider those names at their next meeting.

Because the meeting ran 10 minutes over its scheduled end time, the group agreed to schedule the next meeting by email, including newly added members. The next meeting will be held at Westcave Preserve.
